Dear Resident of the Hulmeville Borough Historical District:

Because you live within the area declared to have historical or architectural significance, we are requesting your assistance and cooperation in preserving the unique character of our town.

In April of 1986, Borough Council enacted a Hulmeville Historical District Ordinance. This was made possible through years of hard work by members of the Historical Society, gathering the documentation necessary and submitting it to the appropriate federal agencies certifying that our Borough met their strict criteria.

The Ordinance also established procedures for the issuance of zoning and building permits for structures located in the "historical district". A Board of Architectural Historical Review was appointed to give advice to Council regarding the advisability of issuing permits for erection, reconstruction, alteration, restoration, demolition, or razing of any structures within the district. The Board considers the following when determining the advice to give to Council (as stated in Ordinance #169).

- 1. The effect of the proposed changes upon the general historic and architectural nature of Hulmeville Borough.
- 2. Appropriateness of exterior architectural features which can be seen from a public street or way.
- 3. The general exterior design, appearance, arrangement, texture and material of the building or structures and relation of such factors to similar features of buildings and structures in the area.

In other words, this ordinance protects the historical area against radical or modern exterior changes to structures within the district, and this is where your assistance is needed.

If you are considering any exterior changes to any structure on your property, i.e. replacing windows, doors, roofing, siding, painting, etc., you must contact our Zoning Officer, Mr. Ed Van Sant at 757-6526 before you begin your project. This will avoid any problems or complications which may delay the completion of your project. Mr. Van Sant will discuss the proposed changes with you, and, if necessary, contact the Board of Architectural Historical Review, of which he is a member. You, and/or whomever you wish to accompany or represent you, will be asked to attend the Board's next meeting to discuss your proposed changes. The Board is very reasonable and is composed of members of our community. After the discussion, they will make their recommendations to Borough Council. The process moves quickly and benefits you and the Borough.

Please help us in this endeavor by following these guidelines. The district increases the status of our town and this impacts on the value of your property.
